Introduction to Oil Painting Sawtooth School for Visual Art Instructor: Brittany Gilbert

Supply List

Below is the supply list for the Introduction to Painting Workshop as well as suggestions for where to buy the supplies.

Paint:

For paint there are a number of brands to choose from. Personally, I use Gamblin and recommend their paints, but brands such as Winsor and Newton or Utrecht are great as well. Different brands can come at very different price points and there are student grade paints you may use that will be less expensive (Ex. Winton Oil Paints). Please select the brand and price point that works best for you.

37ml tubes of the following:


- Titanium White
- Ultramarine Blue
- Cerulean Blue (Hue is fine\*)
- Cadmium Red /Cadmium Red Light (Hue is fine\*)
- Yellow Ochre
- Cadmium Yellow/Cadmium Yellow Medium (Hue is fine\*)

\*If there is the word "hue" after the name, it means that it is a synthetic version of the pigment that is less expensive.

## Brushes:

Long-handled bristle brushes or synthetic bristle brushes are best for this workshop. Any brand will work, but a brand that I recommend is Princeton 6300 Series.

• 3 different sizes of Brights (the largest should be at least 1 inch wide)



Supports (surfaces that we will work on):

- One 11" x 14" pre-primed panel (Canvas or Masonite)
- 1 stretched pre-primed canvas or pre-primed canvas panel 12" x 16"

Miscellaneous Materials:

- Odorless Solvent (approximately 16 oz) Gamsol is what I use, but anything that is odorless is fine.
- Glass jars for solvent and small jar for medium if you are using linseed oil. (You can get a Silicoil Brush Cleaner Tank for the solvent (about \$8), but it does not have to be that fancy. You may use an old jar from your kitchen for either the solvent or medium.)
- Palette Paper (at least 11" x 14"): "Gray Matters" is a good brand option and helpful for mixing colors.
- Metal Palette Knife (approximately 1½ " 2" long)
  Approximate shape: Should be wider at the base and more narrow at the other end with the majority of the sides being straight.



- Pencil
- Eraser

**Optional Materials:** 

- Medium I use a tube of Galkyd which also speeds the drying time, but you may use that or linseed oil (you only need a small amount and I will have some on hand for you try, but you may also purchase your own)
- Sketchbook/Blank sheets of paper for sketches and notes size and type of your choosing
- View Finder
- Apron
- Latex gloves
- Old towel or sheet or aluminum baking tin (See explanation below)
- Piece of plastic wrap to cover your palette and save paint mixtures from session to session.

I always like to let participants know that oil paint is a medium that takes a long time to dry. The exact drying time can range on a number of factors, but it takes about a week to dry to the touch. This means you will be transporting wet paintings back home. You may want to have an old sheet or cloth to lay down in your car or sometimes people have used aluminum baking trays to put the painting in for the ride home. Oil paint will not come out of most materials so please do not wear your favorite clothing. You may also wear gloves for an easier clean up and keep chemicals off your hands.

Where to Purchase Supplies: There are many options for purchasing supplies.

Online: Both options are great, have low, free shipping minimums and fair and comparable prices. Jerry's tends to ship a bit faster in my experience with them.
